ike so many people, we at QED are hugely relieved and thrilled to be able to present the second Yorkshire Asian Young Achievers (YAYAs) awards in person as a live event.

When we conceived the YAYAs, to mark the 30th anniversary of our charity last year, we never once imagined that it would be anything other than a spectacular celebration of the vast wealth of young talent among those of South Asian heritage throughout our beautiful and glorious county.

It certainly achieved its main goal – but in a very different way to that envisaged, as a live broadcast, streamed on the internet, instead of a gala awards presentation dinner in front of an audience of hundreds of people. So not only was it our first awards event but also our first event staged remotely, utilsing the sort of technology which so many of us have been forced to learn and adapt to through the Covid-19 pandemic.

It was fun and exciting but no substitute for a live event and we are absolutely delighted to be able to stage the second YAYAs awards this year in a room full of people!

The YAYAs is the first scheme of its kind set up to recognise the efforts of young people aged 16-30, of South Asian heritage born or living and working in Yorkshire. Its special focus is on those socially-mobile young achievers who have overcome

deprivation and disadvantage, or have broken through traditional barriers to progress. The awards aim to promote social mobility among young South Asians, identify role models to help inspire others from the relevant communities and encourage young South Asians to seek out and take up further and higher education opportunities.

Our first year was hugely successful with scores of entries from right across the county and some amazing winners chosen from a stunning list of shortlisted candidates. We believe the awards will go from strength to strength and the courage, determination, skill and commitment displayed in this year's shortlist is surely a testament to that and should be a source of immense pride for all of us.

None of this, of course, would be possible without the fantastic and generous support of our array of sponsors and I would like to pay tribute to all those who have stepped forward to help us organise and stage the YAYAs. In doing so, I must make special mention of our headline partners, York St John University, who have been right behind the YAYAs from the very start and whose commitment to their success has been inspirational.

We hope that you, in turn, will be inspired by the talent on display and the remarkable stories of those whose achievements offer so much hope for all our futures.

Transforming lives since 1990

ED Foundation is like a chemical catalyst, changing the lives of hundreds of thousands of people for the better while remaining unaltered itself. We have stayed true to our northern roots and our delivery of education, training, employment-related and health services at neighbourhood level continues to inform our campaigning and influencing work.

But we have always moved with the times and adapted to new challenges. In the early days our main focus was on helping people from disadvantaged communities struggling to find work against a background of high local unemployment levels, low educational attainment and the collapse of traditional industries. In more recent times, the Covid-19 pandemic and the tragic killing of George Floyd have presented very different scenarios for us to respond to.

Thirty-one years on we have three new priorities. Firstly, underemployment is becoming as much of an issue as unemployment. Ethnic minorities are still concentrated in low-paid jobs with little responsibility and few opportunities for progress, regardless of their skills and qualifications We encourage and support employers to ensure that their workforces are representative of local demographics at all levels of seniority.

Secondly, we are focusing our efforts on improving the prospects of the most disadvantaged ethnic minority groups. Each faces very

different challenges and these cannot be overcome by one-size-fits-all solutions.

And finally we are helping to build bridges between diaspora communities in Britain and their countries of origin so that we can encourage trade and collaboration between the UK and our international partners. Times have changed but our commitment to helping create a fairer and more equal society remains the same.

When QED began its work in 1990, there were 3.5 million people from ethnic minority backgrounds in the UK. Today there are more than eight million and they make up 14% of the population.

The last three decades have seen these communities make great strides forward in all areas of public life. In 1990 all but four of our MPs were white. By 2017 a record 52 were from an ethnic minority background. Sadiq Khan was elected to one of the country's most high-profile political roles as Mayor of London in 2016. Sajid Javid has held two of the four great Offices of State, becoming Home Secretary in 2018 and Chancellor of the Exchequer in 2019.

Mishal Hussain and Faisal Islam break the news; Maggie Aderin-Pocock and Jim Al-Khalili are among our most well-known scientists; and Turner Prize winner Chris Ofili and director Steve McQueen have blazed a trail in the arts.

But we should not let these successes blind us to the fact that all too many still face an uphill struggle to survive. Some communities - including Indians, Chinese and African Asians - have made

✓ great social and economic progress over the last 30 years.

But others have been left behind. People from Pakistani, Bangladeshi and certain mixed-race backgrounds are still more likely to be out of work or trapped in low-paid occupations and live in housing that is not fit for purpose.

Poor health outcomes mean that they are more likely to suffer many years of chronic illness and die young. And their children under-achieve at school so they start adult life at a disadvantage.

As society becomes increasingly unequal, QED Foundation's mission to break that vicious circle and help everyone fulfil his or her potential becomes more important than ever. At QED, no-one is a number. We take our time to get to know each of our service users and design a customised support programme that meets his or her individual needs. For those who are long-term unemployed, we offer much more than help with looking for vacancies, writing CVs, filling in application forms and learning and practising interview techniques.

We specialise in giving people farthest from the labour market the self-confidence to make those difficult first steps, match trainees to suitable work placements and provide ongoing support to the companies that take them on. Inability to communicate effectively is the most difficult barrier preventing successful integration into British life for recent migrants and isolated members of settled communities alike.

Our English courses help people from ethnic minority backgrounds to improve their speaking, listening, reading and writing skills - even if they are not yet ready for college courses. As well as learning the language, our students are supported to use public services and become more involved in wider society. Formal education can be inaccessible and intimidating but we provide small classes led by professional teachers in a relaxed and friendly environment.

These are backed up by activities where students can practise their English in indoor and outdoor settings. Additional support can be provided by volunteers, who help learners by providing further opportunities for speaking and listening in everyday situations. Our digital inclusion training also gives people the skills they need to play an active part in British society.

These guide complete beginners through the basics of using a computer, browsing the internet and sending emails. After completing one of our courses, learners have the confidence to look for work, manage their money and access public services and health information online.

People from some ethnic minority backgrounds are more likely to be on low, irregular or insecure incomes than the general population. We run money management workshops to help them budget wisely and avoid falling into debt. In the long run, these courses can help families break out of the poverty trap and give their children a better start in life.

Mohammed, who was born in Bradford but is living and studying in Hull, said: "I want to dedicate this award to my first foster family, my auntie, my uncle and my brothers who gave me that initial push into education.

"They really helped me by taking me to the library and just getting me interested in the things I am. I definitely wouldn't be here today without them."

He said it was recognition of his hard work so far and he advised others who wanted to move forward to "continue writing their stories and working hard to be where you want to be"

Mohammed Ali Hussain's story is so remarkable and spans so many areas of achievement that the judges decided to place him in a category of his own for the Young Achiever of the Year Award. They had originally intended to choose an overall Young Achiever from the winners of the 12 award categories but unanimously decided that Mohammed, aged 20, stood out from all other entrants in this year's shortlist.

Of Pakistani heritage, Mohammed overcame a very difficult childhood and chaotic home life to become a mentor, support and champion for the voices of children and young people in care.

He entered care himself at just 18 months old because of alcohol and domestic abuse issues in his family; he was moved to a number of foster placements, each of which broke down, until he was eventually placed in one family at age 10 for nearly a year.

He was then moved to a children's home where he suffered from bullying – both there and at school – and struggled to find the peace and space to study before discovering the solace he needed in libraries, where he used to go to learn on his own.

At 16, he began to live more independently and moved into a semi-independent household and, by the time he was 17, he was living

entirely independently while studying for his exams. He achieved 11 GCSEs and three A-Levels and he is now studying Physics with Astro-Physics at the University of Hull and plans to go on to study for a PhD. He hopes to stay in academia and go on to become a university professor.


Mohammed, who lives in Hull, has been chair of Bradford Children in Care Council (CICC), representing young people in care and care leavers. As chair, he has spearheaded many changes for looked-after and leaving care children from the installation of wi-fi in Bradford's residential homes to campaigns around young people's rights.

He has delivered training to all new foster carers in Bradford – training that has now been incorporated into the instruction all new foster carers complete before they enter the Bradford fostering service. He has also delivered training to students and social workers. He has challenged on behalf of Bradford's care population and is now a member of the young people's panel interviewing prospective employees, from directors to residential workers.

Dr Mohammed Ali OBE, founder and chief executive of Bradford-based QED Foundation, who launched the awards in conjunction with York St John University to mark the charity's 30th anniversary, said: "Mohammed is a truly remarkable young man who has overcome a very difficult background to become a shining star and someone who, we believe, will go on to do great things in the future."

PROFESSOR AKBAR AHMED, FORMER PAKISTANI HIGH COMMISSIONER TO THE UK

Professor Akbar Ahmed PHD is the Ibn Khaldun Chair of Islamic Studies at American University in Washington DC and the former Pakistani High Commissioner to the UK and Ireland. Named "the world's leading authority on contemporary Islam" by the BBC and "perhaps the most influential living authority on contemporary Muslim societies" in the Saudi Gazette, Prof Ahmed is a member of the Washington Muslim-Jewish Advisory Council. He also serves as a trustee for the World Faiths Development Dialogue, chaired by Lord George Carey, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, and is a member of the International Advisory Board for The Senator George J. Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security and Justice at The Queen's University of Belfast. He was awarded the Inaugural Gandhi Peace Award from the Gandhi Center in Washington DC. Prof Ahmed has served

as a Non-resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution, the First Distinguished Chair of Middle East and Islamic Studies at the U.S Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, and the Iqbal Fellow (Chair of Pakistan Studies) and Fellow of Selwyn College at the University of Cambridge. He has taught at Harvard and Princeton Universities. He has produced a number of noteworthy films and authored more than a dozen award-winning books and is also a poet and noted playwright.

PROFESSOR KAREN BRYAN OBE, VICE-CHANCELLOR, YORK ST JOHN UNIVERSITY

Professor Karen Bryan joined York St John University as Vice Chancellor in April 2020. She was previously Deputy V-C (Academic) at the University of Greenwich. Prior to that she was Pro Vice Chancellor for Regional Engagement and Dean of the Faculty of Health and Wellbeing at Sheffield Hallam University. Professor Bryan qualified as a speech and language therapist from the University of Newcastle upon Tyne and also gained her PhD there. Her research interests are in communication difficulties in young offenders and in forensic populations, also the impact of communication difficulties on access to healthcare. She is involved in the development of Registered Intermediaries working for the Ministry of Justice, and was previously a member of the Health Professions Council.Professor Bryan is a Visiting Professor in the Department of Neuropsychology at the University of Warsaw, and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists. She was awarded an OBE for services to higher education in 2018.

Saif Din opened a community boxing and fitness gym in a socially and economically deprived area of Rotherham. The 27-year-old was keen to encourage young boys off the streets and into a safe space to train. Muslim girls also attend. Saif, who lives in Rotherham and is from a Pakistani background, is keen to promote positive male Muslim role models. He runs sessions to suit the needs of the community.



ZAIN UL ABDIN

During the pandemic, Zain, aged 23, who has been the Sports and Wellbeing Officer at the University of Bradford (UBU) charity, organised food deliveries to self-isolating students, including one from England cricketer Adil Rashid. He lives in Bradford and is of Pakistani background. He helped improve the mental health and wellbeing of students and is an ambassador for promoting safety on streets near campus.

OMAR BAHADUR

After graduating from the University of Bradford in Mechanical Engineering, founder and CEO of Faraday Drinks Omar financed his vision to produce a naturally-flavoured water beverage with no artificial ingredients through various jobs. The 26-year-old, who lives in Bradford and is of Pakistani background, began production in 2020 and the drink, named after British inventor Michael Faraday, sold out its initial batch.



SABREEN AHSAN

In 2018 Sabreen launched a digital marketing agency, PIYA Media, which works with creative entrepreneurs from BAME backgrounds to redress the inequalities many face in terms of resources, funding, mentorship and networking. The 29-year-old, who lives in Keighley and is of Bangladeshi background, is the youngest trustee for Young Enterprise, a charity providing skills and financial training for youngsters.



HASEEB ARSLAN

Haseeb studied at air force school in Pakistan. He wanted to be a pilot until his mother became ill and he returned to the UK. Thankfully his mother recovered. The 27-year-old, who lives in Heckmondwike and is of Pakistani background, undertook an IT course at Kirklees College and a degree at Huddersfield University. He runs the charity Plate4humanity in Pakistan and a property business among others.

AWARD SPONSOR

PAS Foundation gives people the tools they need to transform their own lives.

We work among Pakistan's poorest communities, helping young men and women to set out on rewarding careers, become financially

independent and support their families.

We provide vocational training so that they can learn the skills they need to earn a living at home or abroad. We also help with finding jobs or setting up businesses and social enterprises.

Six out of ten people in Pakistan live below the poverty line but the population is youthful – and that means there is hope for the future.

The average cost of a nationally or internationally accredited course in industrial sectors such as construction, hair and beauty or information technology is just £200.

Through fundraising in the UK we are able to provide scholarships and small business support grants so that young men and women can escape a vicious cycle of poverty for good. And by encouraging self-reliance and independence we are also helping to build sustainable and resilient communities.

Yet all too many aspiring young businesspeople across Yorkshire also have many barriers to overcome before they can fulfil their dreams.

We know that Asian graduates are more likely to be paid less or under-employed than their white counterparts. But we are



also impressed by their entrepreneurial spirit – the very same can-do attitude that is shown by the students on our training programmes in Pakistan.

We are proud to sponsor the YAYA Young Entrepreneur award. It proves that when talent is combined with hard work, determination and ambition, anything is possible.

We hope that the stories behind the young people shortlisted for this year's awards encourage others from across the region to believe that – no matter how daunting the first steps into business might seem - they also have what it takes to succeed.

Sonia, who is of Indian background, started a blog 'The Blind Reader' to help raise awareness.



MUNEEB AKHTAR

Since being diagnosed with Crohn's disease in 2016, Muneeb, aged 24, has worked with numerous charities to raise awareness about hidden disabilities including Crohn's and colitis. Muneeb, who lives in Bradford and is of Pakistani background, was part of the national campaign 'Not Every Disability is Visual.' He works mainly in the Asian community speaking about the issues he has faced and supporting others.



SUFIYAN MOHAMMED

Despite his many disabilities and impairments, for the last four years Sufiyan has been involved in a number of inclusive projects for disabled people through the University of Bradford Union of Students. The 23-year-old, who lives in Bradford and is of Pakistani background, embarked on adapted hikes including Snowdon and Ben Nevis, raised over £2,000 for the NHS charity during lockdown and achieved distinctions at Bradford College.
